55 Research manuscripts reporting large datasets that are deposited in a publicly available database
56 should specify where the data have been deposited and provide the relevant accession numbers. If the
57 accession numbers have not yet been obtained at the time of submission, please state that they will be
58 provided during review. They must be provided prior to publication.

59 Interventionary studies involving animals or humans, and other studies require ethical approval must
60 list the authority that provided approval and the corresponding ethical approval code.
